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Legislative Mandates

- ☐ Senate Bill 758 (enacted FY 2007):
 Amendment to the Human Resources
 Codes, Section 26: Sec.
 40.071. DRUG-ENDANGERED CHILD
 INITIATIVE.
 - The department shall establish a drugendangered child initiative aimed at protecting children who are exposed to heroin, cocaine or any of its forms, or methamphetamine or to chemicals and other hazardous materials used in the illicit manufacture of methamphetamine.

Who is a Drug Endangered Child?

Drug Endangered Children (DEC) are those children who suffer physical or psychological harm or neglect resulting from exposure to illegal drugs or persons under the influence of illegal drugs or exposure to dangerous environments where drugs are being manufactured or chemicals used to make drugs are accessible.

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DEC Definition

Texas DEC Alliance's new definition:

"Children who suffer physical or emotional risk as a result of illegal drug use, manufacturing, cultivation or distribution."



"...accept control of the child from law enforcement or first responders; taking control of a child must be consistent within the context of DFPS general removal policies..."


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



Texas Drug Trends and Child Safety






Texas CPS Substance Abuse and Children

- □ About 40% of child abuse and neglect investigations had a person characteristic of drug or alcohol usage. Nationally, figure ranges from 33%-66%.

- □ 60 % of removals were connected to the existence of drug or alcohol use/abuse. Nationally, the estimated percent is 75%.





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Legislative Mandate

□ § 40.072. DUTY TO REPORT; DEPARTMENT RECORDS. (a) To the extent that reporting does not interfere with an ongoing criminal investigation, the Department of Public Safety and each local law enforcement agency shall report to the department on discovering the presence of a child in a location where methamphetamine is manufactured. (b) The department shall maintain a record of reports received under this section and shall include in the record information regarding actions taken by the department to ensure the child's safety and wellbeing.


- □ 235 Methamphetamine Lab Intakes.

Methamphetamine Trend Line based on DFPS Investigations

Less than 1 % (0.007%) of all investigation cases involving substance abuse were related to methamphetamine manufacturing

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DEC Team Lessons Learned

- ☐ Law enforcement partnership is needed.
- ☐ Some teams become inactive due to lack of collaboration and coordination.
- □ DFPS should be an active player in DEC team formation and sustaining teams.

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- ☐ DEC teams should be expanded in the border areas.
- □ DEC teams should include a variety of community partners other than law enforcement and DFPS.
- ☐ Aggregate data feedback should be provided to community stakeholders.

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DEC Team Lessons Learned

- ☐ The establishment of DEC teams is a lengthy process.
- ☐ An effective starting point for the establishment of a DEC team is the local Children's Advocacy Center.


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
Drug Raid Lessons Learned




- ☐ Co-location of DFPS Special Investigators in law enforcement facilities is effective.
- ☐ Trust between DFPS and law enforcement is required.
- Coordination between law enforcement or first responders and DFPS is critical prior to children being placed with another caregiver.
