*The United States has the **highest rate of incarceration** and the **highest number in prison or jail** than any other country.*







General Trends in Corrections

TREND #1:
In the US, the number of incarcerated persons is rising.

*We are incarcerating more,
and it is costing more.
... but the trend is slowing.*





What the Trends Mean

TREND #1:

In the US, the number of incarcerated persons is rising.

➤


More people in jail or prison means **more children under the care** of other family members or foster care.

➤

Most incarcerated parents in state or federal institutions **are over 100 miles away** from their residence.

➤

Having a parent in prison **creates hardships** on the caregivers at home.

TREND #2:


The demographics of incarcerated persons

There is a higher number of African Americans who are incarcerated.

➤

In general, African American families face disproportionate struggles including higher rates of children born to single mothers, living with single parents, or living in poverty.

More women in prison oftentimes shifts the burden to outside of the immediate family.

TREND #3:
Reentering the community
continues to be challenging

➤ Reconnecting with family is one of the biggest burdens when an ex-offender returns back home.


➤ Strong transitional services in the community can go a long way toward steering the ex-offender toward a path of recovery and healing.

Impacts on Children and Families


Children of incarcerated parents are
70% more likely
to become involved with the
criminal justice system.

.... without effective intervention.




Impacts on Children and Families


- ____ million children **with parent in jail or prison**
(1.7)
- ____ million with parent **who is or was** under some
form of supervision
(10)
- 1 in 15 black children has a parent in prison
compared to 1 in ____ Latino or ____ white
(1 in 42 Latino or 111 white)



Impacts on Children and Families

- Approximately 50% of these children are
under 10 years old
- 1 in 5 demonstrate clinically
significant **internalizing** problems
- 1 in 3 demonstrate clinically
significant **externalizing** problems





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Impacts on Children and Families


Some of the impacts to children include:

- Symptoms of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder
- Poor school performance
- Addiction issues
- Negative perceptions of police and other authority figures

Caregivers impacts:

- Increased burden: financial, physical, emotional
- Public assistance is not designed for caregivers
- Prisons are not accessible to visit






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Interventions and Supports

- Mentoring and after school programs
- Sources of parent, child, and family support:
 - ▣ Family resources centers
 - ▣ Faith-based organizations
 - ▣ Community-based agencies
- Advocacy groups
- Training and technical assistance
 - ▣ National Drug Endangered Children
 - ▣ National Resource Center on Children and Family of the Incarcerated
