# **Bruising 101**

- Active kids bruise
- Those that don't cruise, don't bruise.
- Many injuries are non-specific
- PATTERN and HISTORY are critical!

- What was the child wearing?
- What happened after the injury?
- Who else was there?
- If an accidental injury, consider possible supervisional neglect.









































































### Burns


# Patterned Burns


If possible, bring measurements of the potential object used, or the object itself.




















### **Bites**

- Size of teeth may not correlate with gender or person
- Consider swabbing for salivary DNA
- Compare with impressions
