COMPETENCE

- Knowledge base (cont'd)
 - The impact of different custody arrangements on children's well-being
 - Legal standards governing determinations of custody at the time of the dissolution and when a modification is sought
 - Other laws relevant to custody
 - Influence of situational variables on test validity and clinical scores

COMPETENCE

- Knowledge base (cont'd)
 - Knowledge of, and sensitivity to, ethnic, socioeconomic, and cultural issues that impact parenting and test findings
 - Recognition of how one's testimony reflects on the public's perception of the profession, as well as having a profound impact on people's lives

COMPETENCE

- Skill sets
 - Psychological testing
 - Assessment of children and families
 - Interviewing
 - Integration of large amounts of data
 - Ability to communicate in writing and orally with legal professionals and lay people
 - Willingness to consult with others
 - Maintenance of composure in adversity

COMPETENCE

• Do not forget about the ethical obligation to *maintain* competence

CLARIFICATION OF ROLE

- Therapist or evaluator
- Fact or expert witness
- Who is the client? To whom are duties owed?
- Advocate or impartial educator
- What is the referral question? What is the scope of the evaluation?

SCOPE OF EVALUATION

- Affirmative (ethical) duty of the evaluator to define
- Determined by the referral question(s)
- Determines what procedures can be used to adequately address the referral question(s)
- Conclusions and opinions must be supported by the data collected

KNOWLEDGE OF PRIVACY ISSUES

- Difference between privilege and confidentiality
- Difference between subpoena and Court order
- Limits on privilege and confidentiality in custody cases
- Personal access to records

INFORMED CONSENT

- Complex in child custody cases
- Includes:
 - Role of the evaluator
 - Purpose of the evaluation
 - Procedures that will be used
 - Responsibilities of the litigants
 - Fees and payment policies
 - Limits on privilege and confidentiality and who will have access to information

CULTURAL AWARENESS

 Ethical requirement of sensitivity to how culture and similar variables may affect parenting beliefs and practices and results of psychological tests

CONFLICTS OF INTEREST/BIAS

- Disclosure of history of relationships
- Balancing time (with parties and attorneys)
- Giving party opportunity to respond to allegations
- Citing all relevant data about both parties in report, including allegations and responses to them

CONSULTATION/REFERRALS

 Especially important if a special issue is involved about which professional may not have knowledge or experience; that is, the type of issue that occurs in complex cases

COMPLEX ISSUES IN CUSTODY CASES

- Allegations of sexual/physical/emotional abuse or neglect
- Alleged or known substance abuse
- Alleged or known pornography use or promiscuity
- Alleged or known domestic violence
- Child's alleged hatred for, or rejection of, parent

COMPLEX ISSUES IN CUSTODY CASES

- Intrusiveness/over-involvement of extended family or third parties
- Threats by litigant against evaluator
- Serious mental illness in a litigant
- Exceptional needs of a child
- High conflict between parents

FRAMEWORK FOR ETHICAL JUDGMENTS

- Identify the issue and acknowledge its complexity
- Determine whether you have the knowledge and skills to address the issue
- If you believe you are competent, determine whether you need consultation
- Determine whether referral to another professional is necessary

FRAMEWORK FOR ETHICAL JUDGMENTS

- If you are making a referral, is it of the entire evaluation process or to address the complex issue?
- If the referral is for the assessment of a specific issue, what will your relationship be the other professional? How will those data be treated?
- Be mindful of the extra stress
