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### Objective 3:

- Participants will learn how and where to find funded substance abuse coalitions in order to build relationships mutually beneficial to DEC's and the local substance abuse coalition.

### Partnering with Community Substance Abuse Coalitions – Learning Objective 1:

- Basic prevention language
  - Community-Based Coalition is the descriptor for citizens who join together in order to effect change at a grassroots level in a community.
  - Data-Driven Decision Making denotes the coalition has worked to determine the local needs of a community through a thorough review of local data.

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### Partnering with Community Substance Abuse Coalitions – Learning Objective 1:

- Basic prevention language
  - Evidence-Based Practices and Programs are solutions which may be utilized by a coalition to address behaviors, attitudes or perceptions of youth or other populations in a community. These solutions have been tried by other groups and have been found to be effective when implemented with fidelity.
  - Fidelity means any practice or program has been presented to the intended audience as intended.

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Partnering with Community Substance Abuse Coalitions – Learning Objective 1:

- Basic prevention language
  - Public Health Model is a term utilized to indicate how the substance abuse is affecting the population
  - Theory of Change brings together how the goals and objectives, utilizing proven practices or programs will make a difference in a particular area or for a particular substance.

      - Unique in that a community can apply directly for this funding and direct the work in partnership with the federal government
